Focus: Exploring the role of the Holy Spirit and the Church in the Nicene Creed

Key Themes: The Holy Spirit as the Giver of Life, the procession of the Spirit, and the Four Marks of the Church

II. The Holy Spirit in the Nicene Creed

A. "We believe in the Holy Spirit"

- 1. Scripture Passages: John 14:26, Romans 8:26-27, Acts 2:1-4
- 2. The Holy Spirit in the Council of Constantinople (381 AD)
- 3. Fruits of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22-23)
- 4. Gifts of the Spirit (1 Corinthians 12:4-11)

B. "The Lord, the Giver of Life"

- 1. The Spirit's role in creation (Genesis 1:2) and new creation (2 Corinthians 5:17)
- 2. The Holy Spirit as the one who sustains and sanctifies believers

C. "Who proceeds from the Father" (Filioque Controversy)

- 1. Original wording: "proceeds from the Father"
- 2. Later Western addition: "and the Son" (Filioque Clause)
- 3. Theological debate between Eastern and Western Christianity
- 4. Perichoresis: The mutual indwelling of Father, Son, and Spirit

D. "Who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified"

- 1. How the early Church's worship reflected belief in the Spirit
- 2. The Holy Spirit in prayer, sacraments, and worship

E. "Who has spoken through the prophets"

- 1. The Spirit's role in inspiring Scripture (2 Peter 1:21)
- 2. Prophecy and the Spirit's continued work in the Church

III. The Four Marks of the Church —

"We believe in one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church."

- A. One: The unity of the Church despite denominational differences (John 17:20-23)
 - 1. Call toward Unity, love, and mutual accountability, Augustine says, "Schism is worse than heresy."
 - 2. Truth wins: The *contra mundum* principle, "then it is Athanasius against the world."

THE NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven. was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and became truly human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate: he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic* and apostolic church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead,

and the life of the world to come. Amen.

- C. Catholic: Meaning (*kata-holic*)"universal", "according to the whole"—the Church exists for all people, everywhere
 - 1. Whole Space Global/General-Not National/Ethnic/Tribal
 - 2. Whole Time Across Time/Communion of the Saints
 - 3. Whole Kosmos Big picture people
- D. Apostolic: Rooted in the teachings of the apostles and apostolic succession
 - 1. Apostic Teaching
 - 2. Bishops as successors to the apostles
 - 3. Laying on of Hands/Succession
 - 4. Wesleyan Understandings(Elder based process. Greek Orthodox Bishop Erasmus of Arcadia for back-up, and Ecumenical Developments with Episcopalians)
